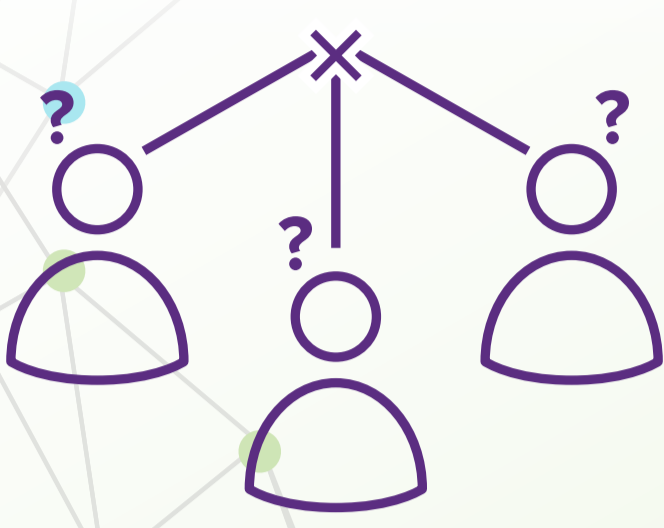
Below are some insights gained from a recent survey, Assessing Collaboration Tech and Tools in Today's Market, to find some answers to the questions above.

**37%** Reported Unproductive Meetings



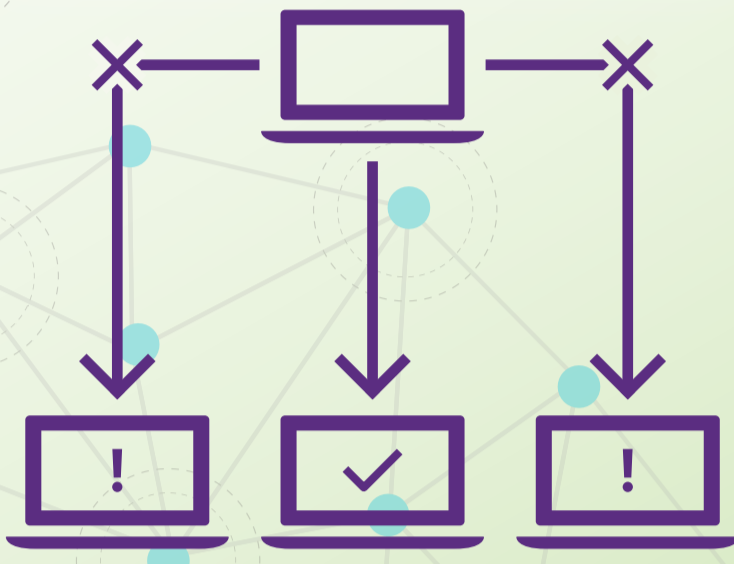
**31%** General Misunderstanding

## WHAT'S MISSING

The primary desires of those surveyed mostly fell into two categories: improved **infrastructure** and increased **interactivity**.



**44%** Reported the desire for multiple screen sharing capabilities

**30%** Reported the desire to collaborate on multiple documents at once



**30%** Reported the desire for annotation capabilities

**29%** Reported the desire to draw on-screen and share on video calls

**28%** Reported the desire for personal home collaboration boards

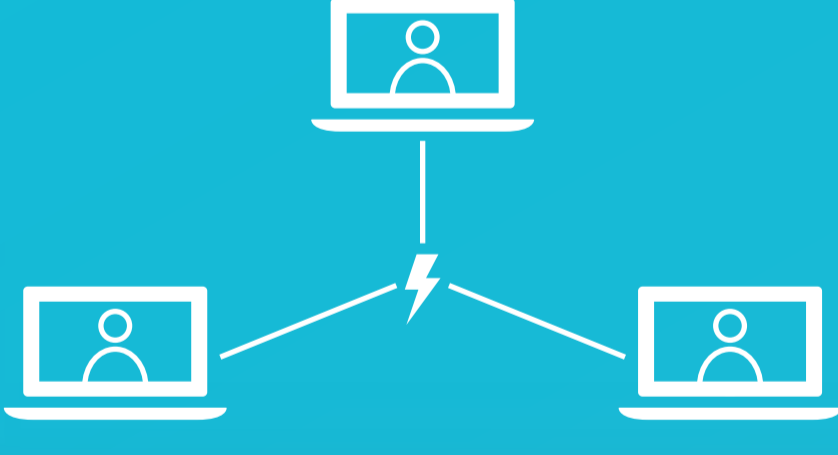

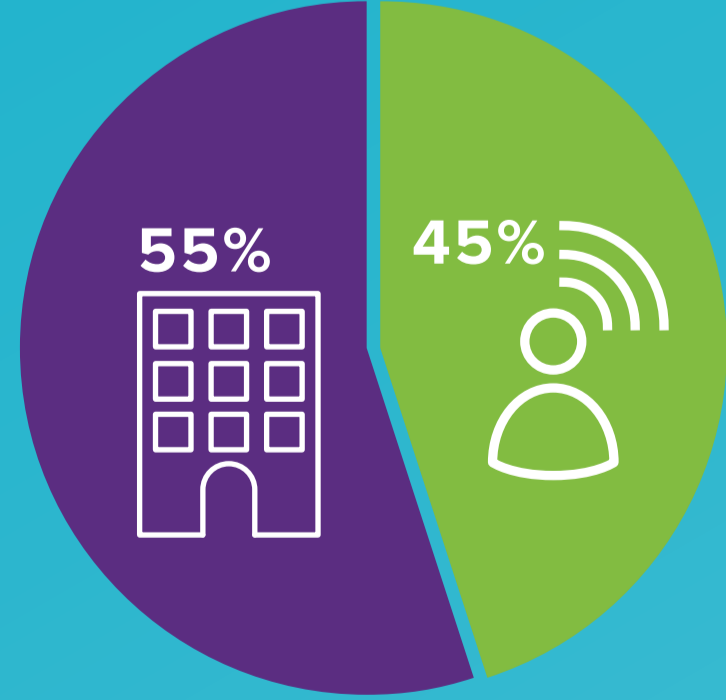

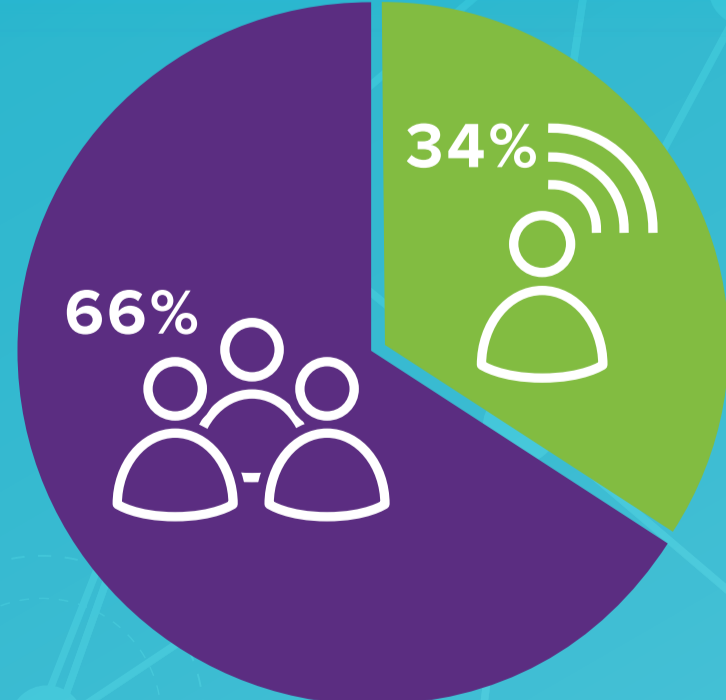
Believe it is important for meeting spaces to accommodate modern digital collaboration



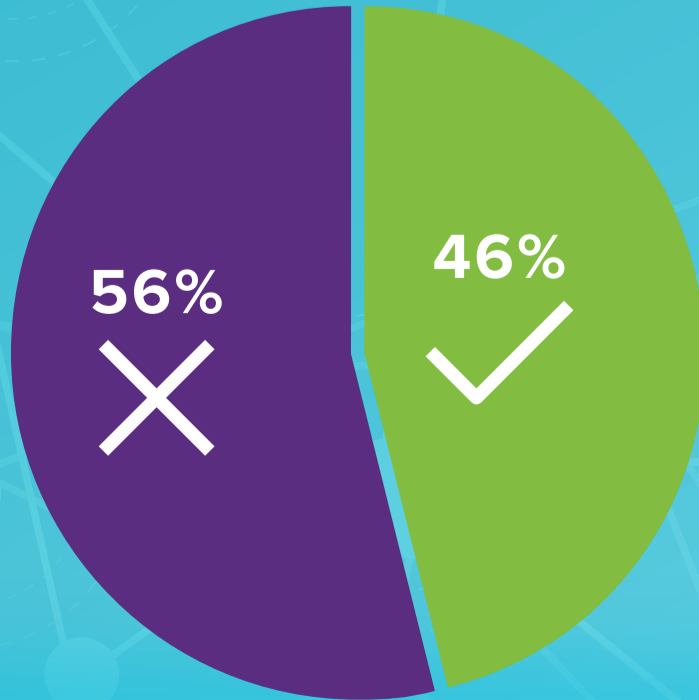
**When asked** if users would return to the office tomorrow if given the chance, **55%** of those surveyed said they would return, while **45%** said otherwise.



**When given the choice** between more meeting rooms with fewer seats or replacing meeting rooms with remote connections, **66%** indicated that they would prefer more meeting rooms with fewer seats, while **34%** reported they'd prefer replacing meeting rooms with remote connections entirely.



**When asked** if users believed their current meeting spaces could properly accommodate social distancing protocol, **46%** claimed they believe that their current meeting spaces would be suitable, while **54%** believe their current meeting spaces are insufficient.



**46%** of users believe they already have the right collaboration tools to handle a hybrid workplace.

**BUT 43%** claim they or their company are still working toward this.
